


Details are still being

The USS Slater, the last destroyer escort afloat in America, will be on the

move this Friday, giving those who live near or along the Hudson River a chance to see the ship in action as she returns home from shipyard repairs.

The *Slater* is expected to leave Staten Island via tugboats around 10:30 a.m. on August 21. The trip to Albany is expected to take approximately 20 hours, but may be impacted by traffic on the river. Updates on its



location will be posted on the <u>Slater's Facebook page</u> throughout the day. The Destroyer Escort Historical Museum recommends viewing the ship from one of the many waterfront parks along the Hudson or at Walkway Over the Hudson State Historic Park in Poughkeepsie, New York,

You can also track the USS *Slater*'s progress by following the tugs on www.marinetraffic.com. Names of tugs will be released on Facebook as the information becomes available.

Located in Downtown Albany at the intersection of Broadway and Quay Street, the ship is expected to reopen to the public by August 26. The hours will be Wednesday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. through the end of November. Court grants permission for company to cut into *Titanic*, recover telegraph

The United States District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia issued an order in May paving the way for R.M.S. Titanic Inc. to recover the wireless Marconi telegraph from inside the wreckage of the

Thousands of cruise workers still stranded by virus

While many of us have had a chance to adapt to the "new normal" brought about by the coronavirus pandemic, there's one group out there that continues to live in an extended Twilight Zone episode. Months after the last cruise ship passenger made their way home, thousands of workers remain in U.S. waters with little hope of seeing dry land for the foreseeable future.

Recent Coast Guard estimates say that nearly 12,000 crew members remain on board 57 cruise ships moored, at anchor or underway in U.S. waters. That number is down from a peak of more than 70,000 in May. Some of them make up the minimum manning needed to maintain basic onboard operations while in port, but there are thousands that are simply waiting for a chance to get back to their home countries.

doomed ship. One of the first of its kind, the telegraph was instrumental in saving more than 705 passengers from the frigid Atlantic in April 1912.

The company says that this is a rare opportunity to rescue the device for future generations and is part of a strategic initiative to bring the history of the *Titanic*, its artifacts, and the science behind exploration to elementary, middle and high schools worldwide. It has already launched a program called *Titanic*: The Virtual Experience - which showcases more than 400 artifacts, full-scale room recreations and



passenger profiles – and is working with national school districts to help bring the virtual exhibition to classrooms across the country. As part of the effort, students will be able to follow the group's recovery of the device.

"We remain dedicated to sharing the legacy of the ship and her passengers with the public," said Bretton Hunchak, President of R.M.S. Titanic Inc. "Without the recovery, conservation and display of these artifacts, the ability to experience first-hand additional significant historic artifacts would be limited to only an exclusive group, those who have the privilege and economic means to travel to the wreck site."

But the ruling upset many in the maritime industry who believe that the wreck site is sacred ground and that it should not be disturbed.

"... [A] hard stop needs to be put in place to prevent [the salvage effort] from happening because the purported benefit of cutting open *Titanic* to recover the Marconi equipment is simply not worth the cost of the resource and is not in the public interest," the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration wrote in a court filing.

The ruling specifically states that the company is permitted to "minimally" cut into the wreck to reach the telegraph room. Officials with R.M.S. Titanic Inc. say that they may be able to reach the telegraph room through an open skylight and not have to alter the ship in any other way. They also stated that they may abort the mission if they determine that the risk is too great.

According to a press release from R.M.S. Titanic Inc., the telegraph in question was reportedly out of service the day before the ship sank. Protocol said that the radio operators were supposed to leave the system alone until they reached port so the repairs could be made professionally. But the staff worked for hours to repair the device, finishing just hours before the ship hit the iceberg, giving them a chance to call for help after the accident.

The biggest problem is simply finding a way to get there. With most cruise lines waiting for normal operations to resume, there isn't an easy way to drop the workers off at their home ports. Similarly, closed borders and governmental travel restrictions have ruled out air travel in many instances.

In one case, crew members aboard the Bahamas Paradise Cruise Line ships filed a class action lawsuit claiming that they were being kept from their homes and families and losing out on wages and employment opportunities. In fact, the lawsuit claims that the workers were forced to sign a document saying that they were voluntarily staying onboard without pay. Those who refused, they said, were threatened that they would not be rehired.

Bahamas Paradise Cruise Lines said in a statement that they were working diligently to get everyone back home, and providing accommodations and food to those who were unable to return home because of strict coronavirus guidelines.

"While we understand the strain that these difficult times have placed on our crew, in particular those who have been unable to return home, we are confident in the approach we've taken to treating all team members with transparency and care," the statement said.

Mayflower II returns home after three years of work

The *Mayflower II*, a full-scale reproduction of the tall ship that brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth in 1620, has finally returned to her berth at State Pier in Pilgrim Memorial State Park.

The ship, a gift from the United Kingdom for the United States' assistance in World War II, had been in Connecticut for three years undergoing \$11.2 million in renovations. She was originally supposed to make a tour of New England ports celebrating the 400th anniversary of the original *Mayflower* voyage, but those plans were scrapped – and the work delayed – because of the coronavirus pandemic. Instead, Plimoth Plantation streamed the

And although the celebrations will have to wait, the public will have a chance to see the boat up close. Tours of the ship were scheduled to begin this week with new COVID-19 measures in place.

The ship debuted in 1957, with stabilization efforts beginning in 2014. Continuous restoration work began at the Mystic Seaport Museum in 2016, with shipwrights from the seaport museum and artisans from Plimoth Plantation engaged in the work. The ship's keel was saved, but nearly 75 percent of the vessel is new, according to Plimoth Plantation.
