Crystal Cruises Eyes SS *United*

States Rehab Project

There was big news on the SS *United States* front this month, as the SS United States Conservancy announced that it has entered into an option agreement with Crystal Cruises that could bring the historic ship back into service.

Under the agreement, the cruise line will cover all the costs associated with preserving the ship while it undertakes a technical feasiblity study to determine what it will take to get the SS *United States* back out on the water. The ship will have to be extensively rebuilt to meet modern maritime regulations, however Crystal Cruises is planning to maintain several original features such as the Promenade and Navajo Lounge. New engines and sophisticated marine technology will be installed to maintain her title as the fastest cruise vessel in the world.

The new SS *United States* will have an 800-guest capacity, featuring 400 suites, dining, entertainment, spa and other other luxury amenities that were part of the ship's storied history. Future itineraries include transatlantic voyages from New York, as well as international voyages around the globe.

The feasibility study is expected to be completed by the end of the year. In the interim, the SS United States Conservancy will continue to expand it's curitorial and archival collections with the intent of

SS Columbia Project Steams On In Wall Street Journal

The SS *United*States isn't the only
restoration project
getting press recently.
The Wall Street Journal
featured the
SS *Columbia* Project in
February, highlighting
the efforts taking place

to save the 114-year-old ship responsible for ferrying thousands between Detroit and the amusement park on Canada's Boblo Island. Along with her sister ship, the *Ste. Claire*, the *Columbia* ran for more than 80 years, retiring on Labor Day weekend in 1991.

Experts estimate that it will take \$15 million to \$18 million to get the boat back on the water, of which only about \$4 million has been raised. Once restored, supporters say the *Columbia* could be used as an event venue or as an educational destination for schoolchildren. It could also be restored to operate daytime cruises from New York City to sites along the Hudson River. Whatever the use, backers say it is important to preserve the vessel. The oldest remaining excursion steamship in the United States, it was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1979 and designated as an historic landmark in 1992.

Royal Carribean gave the world a sneak peak this week at what is destined to become the world's largest cruise ship, the *Harmony of the Seas*. Under construction at the STX Shipyard in St. Nazaire, France, the cruise company gave USA Today a behindthe-scenes tour on the

227,000-ton ship that will pass her record-holding sisters, the *Oasis* of the Seas and the *Allure of the Seas*, by 1,700 tons and nearly 100 passengers.

While there is still much work to be done, the vessel is expected to debut in May. Some of the proposed amenities include a Bionic Bar where robots serve the drinks, an ice rink, a 10-story water slide, and Virtual Balconies for inside cabins that don't have windows.

History Channel Program Continues Search For Billions on RMS *Republic*

The legend of the lost treasure aboard the RMS *Republic* is alive again thanks to a new eight-part series on the History Channel that premiered earlier this month.
"Billion Dollar Wreck" follows famed treasure hunter Martin Bayerle and his son Grant as they seek a bounty that reportedly includes 150,000 American Eagle gold coins.

One of the largest and most luxurious ocean liners of its time, the *Republic* sank shortly after leaving New York Harbor on January 24, 1909. Bayerle is credited with discovering the wreck off the coast of Nantucket in 1981 (not far from where the *Andrea Doria* also lies), but a recovery effort in 1987 came up empty. Armed with more research, Bayerle said he is now convinced that he knows the exact location of the treasure.

Government Agency Jumps the Gun on Historic Designation for SS Badger

It appears that an errant social media post lead to some

premature accolades for the SS *Badger*, the largest car ferry ever to sail Lake Michigan and the only coal-fired steamship still in operation in the United States. An entry on the National Park Service's verified Facebook page announced that the *Badger* had been designated a National Historic Landmark. The problem is that officials quickly retracted the post, saying that the paperwork wasn't complete and that the *Badger's* application had not received final approval.

SSHSA's 2002 Ship of the Year, the *Badger* was built in 1952 and designed specifically to handle the rough conditions that it would likely encounter during year-round sailing on Lake Michigan. Its passenger accommodations made it one of the most popular car ferries sailing the great lakes until it was taken out of service in 1990. The vessel was later revived to carry leisure passengers and their vehicles, and steams from Manitowoc, Wisconsin, to Ludington, Michigan from May through October.

There's no word yet on a timetable on when there might be a ruling from the Department of the Interior. The same body placed the ship on another historical list, the National Register of Historic Places, in 2009.
