Ship Disaster Documents Found in SSHSA's Archives

As SSHSA staff and volunteers go through previously unprocessed boxes of archival items, interesting discoveries are being made. One of these discoveries was in a folder innocuously labeled, "Ship Disasters." But in fact, the folder documented one disaster: the sinking of the Ward Line's SS *Merida* in May 1911 after colliding with the United Fruit Company's SS *Admiral Farragut*. The folder is stuffed with mostly notarized affidavits testifying the items lost by passengers. These documents give a unique view into early 20th century fashion and economics, as well as a brief window into who these people were.

The SS Merida was built in 1906 for the Ward line by Cramp & Sons in Philadelphia. She was a twin screw ship with triple expansion engines. She was en route to New York City from Havana, Cuba, when on May 12, 1911 she collided with the SS Admiral Farragut in dense fog. All of her passengers and crew were rescued, with only one passenger injured, according to contemporary news articles. That passenger was the wife of "A. Peon" or Augusto Peon, who together

with his family and two maids were sailing to Paris to "await the end of Mexican troubles," most likely referring to the revolution that erupted that year.

The records of the sinking in our collection include the notarized listing of the Peon family, including his injured wife, Jacinta Bolio de Peon. They were clearly a wealthy family. Some of Augusto's lost possessions included a pair of French shoes, a cashmere suit, silk socks, and a case of literature and medical texts. His full list of

expenses was \$1,064.60. His wife Jacinta's list included corsets, a Kimona (Japanese inspired blouse), several ostrich feathers, and necklaces of black pearls, emeralds and diamonds. Her jewelry alone valued \$41,500.

Other passengers did not have nearly as expensive or extensive lists. Most ran up to a few hundred American dollars. Items reflect common early 20th century fashion: petticoats, aprons, watch chains, suits, and handkerchiefs. Others reflect the length and purpose of one's travel: cameras, souvenirs, parasols and walking canes. Or, as from a British couple's list: a Webley automatic pistol, a Lancaster rifle, binoculars, and saddles.

When Carnival Cruise Line's newest ship, the 3,954-passenger *Carnival Vista*, launches May 1, 2016 in the Mediterranean, it will take onboard entertainment to a new level. The *Vista* will also include an onboard brewery, aft pool, the New England-inspired Seafood Shack, and a dedicated families-only zone with lounge and cabins.

Carnival Vista will sail a variety of Mediterranean itineraries in its first season, calling on ports throughout Italy, France, Spain, Croatia and Turkey. After a season of eighteen sailings in Europe, the ship will embark on a 13-night transatlantic crossing October 21, 2016, arriving in New York City on November 3, 2016. It will then operate a series of sailings from New York. The ship's final homeport will be announced at a later date.

Maritime Training Complex to be built at San Jacinto College

San Jacinto College recently broke ground on the future San Jacinto College Maritime Technology and Training Center, and is expecting to complete the 45,000-square-foot project in 2016.

Texas leads the United States in export tonnage, and there are more than one million jobs related to marine cargo activity at the Port of Houston and private terminals, according to a recent report by the Port of Houston. San Jacinto College's Maritime program has awarded about 3,200 U.S. Coast Guard-required certifications since 2010, and has developed the state's first associate degree maritime transportation program. Due to the rapid growth of the program, the college purchased 13 acres of land along the Port of Houston to build the Maritime Training Center.

Funds from the new gift will be used for advancing the Conservancy's various curatorial programs, including planning for the SS *United States* Museum

of Design and Discovery. Preliminary designs for the museum include restoring key areas of the ship to create innovative and immersive experiences for visitors.

The Museum and the Conservancy's curatorial and archival programs will be developed in consultation with an advisory council and other specialists, including maritime historians and experts previously associated with the Smithsonian Institution, Philadelphia's Franklin Institute, and the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.

Jim Pollin stated, "Last year, I asked the world to help save our flagship. I asked people to join me in ensuring this majestic piece of American history had a future. This new gift is an amazing display of confidence in the Conservancy's vision and an acknowledgement of the ship's historic importance for all of us."

New Novel *Dogs in the Sun* features RMS *Queen Mary*

Author and SSHSA member Janice Convery brings to life the last voyage of RMS *Queen Mary* in her new novel, *Dogs in the Sun*, a tropical odyssey about a boat, a baby and a body that propels a diverse cast of characters to the shores of their new selves.

Students can earn certificates and associate degrees, as well as receive worker maritime training. Course offerings will also include U.S. Coast Guard required deck and engineering coursework to prepare mariners to work on commercial vessels in jobs ranging from a deckhand on a towboat to the captain of an oil tanker.

"This facility is going to make a big impact and help mariners stay competitive in a global industry," stated consultant Rear Adm. William W. Pickavance Jr., a former merchant mariner who spent thirty-two years on active duty as a commissioned officer with the U.S. Navy.

When it's completed, the San Jacinto College Maritime Technology and Training Center will have fifteen classrooms and engineering simulators to train maritime engineers to handle hydraulic, electric, pump control, motor control, heating and air conditioning and refrigeration jobs. There also will be a multipurpose space for industry conferences and corporate partner meetings.

Mariner's Museum Library features a new luxury cruise ship exhibit

The Mariner's Museum Library, located in Newport News, Virginia, has created a new exhibit titled "The Golden Age of Luxury Liners." The new exhibit, under the direction of student intern Alexandra McKay, features luxury cruise ships from 1920 to 1950, and includes items that would be found on these cruise ships, such as dinner menus, postcards, flyers, silverware, and glassware. All the items in the exhibit come from several different vessels and focus on different aspects of luxury cruising.

In many ways, *Dogs in the Sun* is an ode to the grand old luxury liner, her impeccable service record during peacetime and war, her sleek, vast beauty, her record-breaking superlatives, and her one-of-a-kind spirit that, despite all odds, still lives on.

"I first visited the ship on October 31, 1990, and I was hooked," recalls Convery. "It wasn't until I started writing the book, many years later, that I realized the importance of that day. It was the 23rd anniversary of RMS *Queen Mary*'s lastever departure from Southampton, which kicked off a 39-day voyage down the coast of South America, around Cape Horn, up

Mexico and on into California's Long Beach where, at 12:07PM on Saturday, December 9, 1967, Captain John Treasure Jones uttered the words that ended the liner's sea-going career and ushered in her sedentary life: 'finished with engines.'"

In addition to researching her subject widely and volunteering on board the ship in 2002, Convery includes anecdotes she's gleaned from personal encounters with former crew, most notably a cheeky, blue-eyed chap named Devine who worked in the engineering department on both *Queens* in the 1960s. This former elevator greaser claims he once rode his Norton motorbike up the aft gangway, through the working alleyway, and back down the forward gangway, much to the wry displeasure of Captain Marr.

Devine also corroborated that the *Queen Mary* was indeed a happy ship. Perhaps that's why so many of us are still drawn to her. Convery is convinced one can still pick up the echoes of dedicated officers and crew, still imagine a certain easy, inspiring ambience that must have permeated the vessel when she was at the top of her game. Even today, she's alive, really, with the energy of past glories and triumphs, and aren't we happy she's still around to visit in Long Beach and, most recently, in the pivotal role she plays in *Dogs in the Sun*.
