USCGC *Ingham* named SSHSA Ship of the Year

Already one of the country's most decorated vessels, the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter *Ingham* added another accolade to her resume last month when she was celebrated as the Steamship Historical Society of America's 2016 Ship of the Year.

A proud veteran of war, the *Ingham* now serves as a floating National Historic Landmark and National Memorial to Coast Guardsmen who lost their lives in World War II and Vietnam. The award was presented on Tuesday, January 24, as part of the Board of Director's winter meeting in Key West.

Built at Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, she served from 1936 to 1988 in a variety of situations, including the Atlantic (31 Convoys), Mediterranean and Pacific Theaters in World War II. She is the last U.S. warship afloat today to have sunk a Nazi U-Boat (U-626), and she served as the flagship when General MacArthur re-captured the Philippine Island of Corregidor in 1945. She also served as a flagship for

Admiral Arthur Struble in the Leyte Gulf amphibious landings. At war's end, she served as flagship for the South China Naval Forces under RADM Elliot Buckmaster in China, Formosa and Vietnam.

The *Ingham* remains the only cutter to ever be awarded two Presidential Unit Citations for

extraordinary heroism in action against an armed enemy on or after December 7, 1941, for duty in Vietnam that included 92 gunfire support missions and two major operations, "Swift Raider" and "Sea Lords."

After the ship was decommissioned, she was donated to the Patriots Point Maritime Museum in Charleston, South Carolina, as a museum ship. She was transferred to Key West, Florida, in 2009 to be the Favorite SSHSA on Flickr to view images of conferences, events, and meetings, and scans of images from SSHSA's photo archives.

Officials work to keep sunken USS *Houston* safe from scrappers

While scrappers are believed to have destroyed or removed dozens of sunken World War II-era ships off the coast of Indonesia over the course of the last several decades, a recent study by the Australian National Maritime Museum (ANMM) and the National Research Centre of Archaeology Indonesia shows that the USS *Houston* remains largely intact.

Sunk on March 1, 1942, during the Battle of Sunda Strait, the wreck is the final resting place for more than 650 U.S. sailors and Marines. As such, the United States government is working with its counterparts in Indonesia to protect the site from illegal scrappers.

"We take very seriously our obligation to remember the service of American and allied sailors who have made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of freedom," Sam Cox, director of the Naval History and Heritage Command, said in a statement provided to USNI News. "We'll do everything we can, and work with everyone we must, to safeguard their final resting places."

Less certain is the fate of the Australian warship HMAS *Perth*, which also sank during the Battle of Sunda Strait. Weather issues impacted the sonar images that were taken during the most recent study, and a physical dive is needed to determine the full extent of the damage.

These are not the only shipwrecks under scrutiny overseas. Reports over the last several years show that many Dutch, British, Australian and Are you a Naval history buff with a great research idea stuck in your head? Well now is the time to get writing!

All winners will be recognized by the Chief of Naval Operations at the plenary session of the McMullen Naval History Symposium at the U.S. Naval Academy in September. First Prize Winners will be published in Naval History magazine and online with Naval History and Heritage Command. Other essays may be published in Naval History or Proceedings, or online by the Naval History and Heritage Command.

Grant will fund museum upgrades, environmental education

The Independence Seaport Museum is moving forward with some exciting improvements after receiving a \$1.2 million grant from the William Penn Foundation.

Funding will not only support essential upgrades and expansion of the museum's docks, located at the northern end of the Penn's Landing Marina in the heart of the Delaware River waterfront, but also the next phase of planning for River Alive!, a new interactive exhibition showcasing the science, ecology and stewardship of the Delaware River watershed.

"Independence Seaport Museum is honored to receive this grant, which recognizes our role as a cultural and educational gateway to the Delaware River and watershed," says John Brady, President and CEO. "Through the Foundation's generosity, we are excited to offer more opportunities for residents and visitors alike to experience our waterways and learn more about their vital place in our community and urban ecosystem."

The museum is also managing a second grant from the William Penn Foundation on behalf of a group of 23 environmental education centers located on the Circuit Trails system and near the Delaware River or its tributaries. This grant supports the network's efforts to develop shared programs and coordinated messaging about the importance of clean water and the preservation of our waterways.

"The William Penn Foundation's Watershed Protection Program advances protection and restoration of clean water in the Delaware River and its tributaries by supporting science-informed conservation, advocacy, and stewardship," said Andrew Johnson, the program's director. "Together, Independence Seaport Museum's exciting interactive River Alive! exhibit – literally at the river's edge – along with increased capacity to offer boating programs on the river between Philadelphia and Camden will be a keystone for efforts by the museum and other conservation organizations to reach thousands of students and adults annually to build awareness of and support for clean water."

New Rolls-Royce has maritime flair

Rolls-Royce is bidding farewell to its Phantom VII series with an ocean liner-inspired design. The custommade vehicle has a deep shade of Blue Velvet paint on the outside, stylized wood inlay on the dash, and car clocks that recall the style that might have been found in grand ships like the *France* or the *Normandie*.

Under the hood is the same 6.75-liter naturally aspirated V12 engine that produces 454bhp - good for 0 to 60 mph in 6.1 seconds and a top speed of 149 mph.

But it's the interior that will catch most people's attention. The wooden trims depict "the golden age of travel," with complex marquetry in an art deco style. Fittingly, the object that takes center stage is a 1930s ocean liner.

As you would expect from Rolls-Royce, this won't come cheap. Current estimates put the car's value at more than \$400,000. <u>Click here for more information and photos</u> from Road and Track.
