### QE2 brought back to life off the coast of Dubai

After more than 10 years on the sidelines, the *Queen Elizabeth* 2 finally reemerged to the public last month at her new home in Dubai. Her cruising days long over, she will serve as a floating luxury hotel off the coast of the Middle East country, something that many were starting to believe would never happen.

Cunard sold the ship to Dubai World for about \$100 million in 2007, and the ship received a grand welcome when she pulled in to Port Rashid the following year. However, the world economic crisis took its toll on her new owners, who were forced to delay their plans. Years went by, and some believed she was destined to be sold again, perhaps this

But then a post appeared on the liner's Facebook page in mid-April announcing the soft opening of the new hotel, and soon stories were popping up in media outlets across the world. Although the initial plan was to gut the vessel, the owners ultimately decided to restore the ship at a cost of more than \$100 million.

So far, seven of the *Queen Elizabeth 2*'s 13 decks are under operation, with 224 cabins available. The Dubai government hopes to push that number to 600-800 rooms before the year is over, ranging from a \$150 a night to \$15,000 a night for the Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary suites.

The vessel has had a storied career. She traveled more than 6 million miles, carried 2.5 million passengers and crossed the Atlantic more than 800 times. She joins her Cunard ancestor, the *Queen Mary*, and the former Holland America ship *Rotterdam* as one of the few classic liners to cross over to a new use after retirement.

### Three SSHSA award winners net \$500k in national maritime grants

The Maritime Administration announced more than \$2.6 million in grants last week, including more than \$500,000 to three SSHSA Ships of the Year.

The Liberty Ship *John W. Brown* (2007) and the *Virginia* V(1995) each received \$200,000 in funding, while our most recent Ship of the Year, the *Columbia* (2017), received just over \$100,000.

The National Maritime Heritage Program grant awards are made possible through a partnership between the Maritime Administration and the National Park Service, and are funded by the recycling of vessels from MARAD's National Defense Reserve Fleet.

"From exploration, to industry, and military conflict, these grant projects tell the story of our nation's history through a maritime lens," National Park Service Deputy Director Dan Smith said. "Through a collaborative effort, the National Park Service is dedicated to conserving these treasures and enhancing public awareness of our maritime heritage."

"Since 2014, MARAD has provided more than \$7 million in funding to support our nation's maritime heritage projects," said Maritime Administrator Mark H. Buzby. "These ships, lighthouses and other strategic maritime vessels have played an integral role in our nation's success at sea. By preserving these maritime artifacts, we hope to inspire future generations with America's maritime legacy."

Located in Seattle, Washington, the Virginia V Foundation will use its portion of the matching grant funds to reframe the stern of the historic ship, while Project Liberty Ship will preserve the hull and underwater portions of the *John W. Brown*. The SS Columbia Project's funding will be used to stabilize and preserve the former Bob-Lo boat.

# Canada to offer apology for turning

- The Maritime Museum Association of San Diego, \$49,993 to ensure the long-term stability of the sailing ship *Star of India*.
- San Francisco Maritime National Park Association, \$174,945 for Phase II of the USS *Pampanito* World War II submarine Preservation Project.
- **Mystic Seaport Museum**, \$103,703 for the 1921 Fishing Schooner *L.A. Dunton* Documentation and Survey Project.
- **Destroyer Escort Historical Museum**, \$200,000 for the shipyard repair of the USS *Slater* mast and hull.
- **City of Alexandria**, \$97,117 for the conservation of Alexandria's 18th-century Wooden Ship.

# Officials celebrate launch of latest Navy ship

The Navy christened its newest Independence-variant littoral combat ship (LCS) earlier this month during a ceremony in Mobile, Alabama. The future USS *Cincinnati* (LCS 20) is the fifth U.S. Navy ship to honor Ohio's third largest city.

"The future USS Cincinnati is a symbol of the strong connection between the people of Cincinnati and the Navy and Marine Corps team," said Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer. "The ship serves as a testament to our commitment to growing the Fleet and our partnership with industry and the American public."

The principal speaker was Cincinnati Councilmember David Mann, also a former member of the U.S. House of Representatives from Ohio. Former Secretary of Commerce Penny Pritzker served as the ship's sponsor.

An LCS is a modular, reconfigurable ship designed for near shore operations. Using an open architecture design, the ship can easily be reconfigured for different roles, including anti-submarine warfare, mine countermeasures, anti-surface warfare intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance, and more. The USS *Cincinnati* is approximately 418

### away MS St. Louis during WW II

Nearly 80 years after a boatload of Jewish refugees were turned away from North America as they tried to flee the Holocaust, Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced that he will deliver a formal apology to survivors and their families in the House of Commons.

Captained by Gustav Schröder, the MS *St. Louis* was carrying more than 900 German Jews seeking asylum from the horrors taking place in Europe during World War II. The refugees were turned away by Cuba and the United States before heading to Canada, which relied on a "none is too many" immigration policy to send the ship back to Europe, ultimately resulting in the deaths of 254 of the passengers.

"An apology in the House of Commons will not rewrite this shameful chapter of our history," Trudeau said in a statement. "It will not bring back those who perished or repair the lives shattered by tragedy. But it is our collective responsibility to acknowledge this difficult truth, learn from this story, and continue to fight against anti-Semitism every day, as we give meaning to the solemn vow: 'Never again."

Canada's apology follows one made by the U.S. State Department six years ago that included 14 survivors of the incident. Cordell Hull, secretary of state in 1939, advised President Franklin Roosevelt not to accept the Jews and ordered U.S. Coast Guard vessels to follow the *St. Louis* and prevent it from landing off the coast of Florida.

Built by the Hamburg-America Line in 1928, the *St. Louis* was a dieselpowered ship that regularly sailed the

feet long and 104 feet wide. She was built under a \$4.5 billion contract with Austral USA that includes 15 littoral combat ships.

The previous four ships named *Cincinnati* each had a colorful history while serving the country. The first ship under that name was a stern-wheel casemate gunboat that served during the Civil War and was sunk by Confederate fire on two separate occasions. Raised both times and returned to service, she was decommissioned following the war.

The second *Cincinnati*, a cruiser commissioned in 1894, served extensively in the Caribbean before, during, and after the Spanish-American War before being decommissioned in 1919. The next in line was a light cruiser commissioned in 1924 that served around the world and earned a battle star for World War II service that included convoy escort and blockade duty. She was decommissioned in 1945 after the war ended. The most recent *Cincinnati* was a Los Angelesclass fast attack submarine commissioned in 1978. The boat served for 17 years before being decommissioned in 1995.

trans-Atlantic route from Hamburg to Halifax, Nova Scotia, and New York before the war. While on board, the refugees were treated well at Schröder's insistence. Dances and concerts were conducted, religious services were held in the dining room, and swimming lessons took place in the on-deck pool.

Upon returning to Europe, the *St. Louis* was adapted as a German naval accommodation ship from 1940-44. Following the war, she was used as a hotel ship in Hamburg in 1946, and later sold for scrapping in 1952.
